Other times I talk about the positives like Camden's community policing strategy- crime is down in most categories and the number of murders have been halved from the most violent year in 2013. And there are the various building projects going on in town, revitalizing certain greas.

Yet no matter what physical changes happen, the most dramatic shift is always the inner change in people. DSW is a bridge - connecting volunteers and neighbors in relationship with each other. Saint Bruno pointed to the cross as "the still point in the turning world." What a great image for the place God calls us to as part of the positive change in this world- the change in hearts.

Approaching every person in a gentle and humble way fosters peace and justice in the world community. Oblate ministries usually focus on Christian education, missions, social justice, and other pastoral ministries.



#### St. Francis de Sales

He is also the patron saint of the deaf and hard of hearing- he once created a sign language to teach a deaf man about God. # Serving Where the Need is Greatest

The many needs of Camden are obvious- 43% of the population lives below the Federal poverty line, and the high school dropout rate is above 50%. DSW is present in places of pain and struggle, offering direct service where it's needed.



#### Homeless Shelters

DSW partners with homeless shelters providing safe shelter and connection to vital local resources



#### Sandwich Ministry

Feeding over 300 people on weekdays, the Cathedral's Sandwich ministry is a relied upon source of food for many in the area



#### After School Care

Volunteers engage with Holy Name students during recess and after school- two times where it's important to be safe and off the streets



#### Neighborhood Beautification

Alley cleanups, tree plantings, urban farming, and park cleanups all keep the neighborhood safe and clean




Abbey Doherty Service Year Volunteer '14-'15

# Breaking to be Filled Again

When I came to Camden, I intended to use my gifts to explore the realities of an impoverished yet spiritually, historically, and emotionally rich community. What I experienced, through the blessing of many encounters with people in Camden, was a change within who I am.

Gallery Eleven One inspired my imagination, meetings at The Last Stop blessed me with new friends, and the youthful atmosphere of Hopeworks gave me the experience of being a mentor and role model. Hopeworks is a



place that shed light on some of the problematic factors of living in Camden. The essence of ministry to one another and to one's community was seen in the 275 people who volunteered at the KaBoom! playground build, the teaching mission of Urban Boatworks, and the impetus to improve the urban landscape through the work of Cooper's Ferry.

"Be who you are and be that well" St. Francis de Sales

Camden broke my heart and put it back together fuller than it was before. I experienced moments in which I was absolutely aware of both suffering and goodness. I was warned that the transition going back home would be the most challenging part of doing any extended period of service. Upon returning home, I wasn't expecting the feeling of aloneness that heartache. Service can be heartbreaking and full of hope. Sometimes it feels pointless (the work of your hands just isn't enough sometimes), and other times feels like everything in the world all at the same time.

Serving with DSW broke my heart and filled it with love, compassionate encounters of suffering, and called me out on our responsibility to look out for all. As we belong to God as his children, we belong to each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. The grace by which I loved and was loved in return was life-giving in every way. I am prepared to handle the challenge to love the people of this world as I "go forward in joy and [am] sent forth in peace" (Isaiah 55:12).

# A Quiet, Active Love

There's a certain notion in "being called" that suggests radicalism, going where no one else has been, creating a kind of lifestyle that others will applaud by virtue of it being countercultural. Before coming to DSW in Camden or starting at Cristo Rey-Philly, I held an arrogant self-perception that I was a radical. I was going to the frontier of social justice for citizens of Camden or disadvantaged high school students while my peers interviewed for jobs and searched for snazzy apartments in the city.



During my service year however, I realized that the "radical" characteriza-

tion of going to where you are called has nothing to do with where you are going but rather who has summoned you there and why. Working at Cristo Rey, I've learned that I am not the only one driven to come alongside students who need academic, emotional and spiritual support. In fact, I am one of many. Devoting your life to serving others can at times feel isolating. Some days I walk away feeling like I have not impacted anyone, and there is a small voice of failure that begins to announce itself in my mind. This specific isolation is not only dangerous but also the reason why the work of social justice for the poor has garnered its radical characterization. Perhaps, the radical aspect of doing this year of service is this very lesson; I am not the only one.

The radical or extraordinary part of living a life for others originates in how we have responded to a call. The radical notion is that serving others is not featured on NBC nightly news or given weeks of media attention. Today, a "radical" deemed as such by the populace, attracts attention through confrontational methods or even, unfortunately, brutal violence. The radicalism of service—the real radicalism—is more that those called have accepted a task that is ordinary. Those who serve are radical because they are humble. Over roaring opinion and movement, they choose quiet, active love

# Perception Versus Reality

After confirming I would volunteer in Camden for two weeks, I thought it would be a good idea to research the city a bit to get a better understanding of what my time there might be like. The information was mainly negative, describing steady population decreases and well above average crime rates. When I told some of my friends that I was going to Camden, they all had similar responses- "Don't get shot!". These kinds of statistics and comments had me thinking. Does Camden have any hope of rising as a city? Over my time in Camden I wanted to try and find an answer to this question. What I found is not going to transform the city overnight, but it's definitely a sign that the future may be bright.

For most people, when they think of Camden, they think of a poor, struggling city, with a high drug and crime rate. While that certainly exists, the news mostly portrays the negative things that happen while missing all of the amazing acts of charity and kindness that go unreported on an everyday basis. Every weekday morning at DSW in Camden I had the chance to work with three of the most dedicated, passionate, and humorous women I have ever met: Susan, Erma, and Rita. These three are the fearless leaders of Sandwich Ministry- serving 400+ people who can't afford food. Thanks to countless food donations, these "power women" (how I like to describe them because if they want something done, it gets done) are able to feed the hungry consistently every weekday of the year.

It's the work of these women, dedicating their lives to serving others, that give me hope for the future of Camden. So yes, unfortunately, Camden gets a bad reputation. However, many people are making a difference like Susan, Erma, and Rita. They are the "angels" of the city whose character is often over looked by the perception of Camden.

# A Life Giving Year

In the middle of my service year, I realized it had been six months since we arrived, and six months were ahead of us to be explored, to challenge us, to change us, and to give of ourselves. Our experiences and the individuals who touched our hearts will impost where and how we choose to serve on the journey that is our lives.



Someone asked how I have changed this year. After a little bit of thought, my answer was that the perceptions I had of Camden have been altered. Before arriving in Camden in August, all I knew were articles and news reports of a

violence-ravaged and drug-riddled city left in despair. But even after only a couple days here, I realized there's more to the story than the media reports. There are hope-filled residents and many who have come to Camden to improve the city and the lives of those who live in it. After a few months at my placement. I had all but forgotten



my preconceived notions of Camden. The kids at Holy Name grade school are full of hope and have ambitious career goals. I thought that teenagers from Camden would be trouble-makers that I would be unable to relate to. However, I was wrong on both counts. The teens who belong to CASA are normal teens: they love hanging out with friends but struggle with math, just like I did in high school. In the end, the youth I work with aren't so different from me or any other human; they just grew up in different circumstances.

Living and working in Camden has given names and faces to the impoverished and in doing so, has given me a new perspective.

Some would say I've "given up" a year of my life to do service, but I disagree. It's say this year is life-giving.
